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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

"I tell you the truth, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did for Me." Matthew 25:40

I volunteer at Yadkin Christian Ministries and enjoy doing this in memory of my Mom, Susan Steelman. On Wednesdays I shop for the same items she used to, things we cannot get from the Food Bank. On some Wednesdays I have my SUV loaded with 15 cases of toilet paper, 5 cases of laundry detergent, toothpaste, and soap. When there is a good sale, I get 45 cases or more of pinto beans, tomatoes or pork'n beans. I can remember seeing my Mom pull up at the Ministry to unload her car from a trip to the Food Bank. Her car was packed to the ceiling with marshmallows and she had more items in the front seat beside her. When she got out of the car, her smile showed what a joy it was to be able to serve and help others.

It is with this same spirit that our ladies serve at FEMAP. Peggie Baxter, who passed away in January at the age of 84, served at FEMAP and was also very active in NC USFW. She was President when I first became involved as Treasurer. I can still see her smile of joy. We are so grateful for Peggie's leadership and will remember her fondly. As you consider your Greensheet projects for February, please remember FEMAP.

Along this same line of service of helping those in need, our Spring Conference will feature Marian Beane who has dedicated many years of service to Right Sharing of World Resources. RSWR is over 50 years old and was started as an initiative at an international conference at Guilford College. RSWR 's mission is "the right sharing of world resources, being called from the burdens of poverty into the abundance of God's love and a calling to work for equity through partnership with our brothers and sisters." Marian told me how grants from RSWR have made a difference and changed lives. Women in India, Kenya and Serra Leone apply for a loan and are trained in business skills. They help other women by loaning them money to purchase seeds or farm animals. The money loaned to these women is paid back with interest. No money is paid back to RSWR. Marian said that she was truly humbled by the gratitude of the women who received the loans.

I asked Marian what we could do to help. Money is raised mostly from Quakers but a simple act that we can do is to collect stamps (used and new). In 2009-2017, used stamps were collected and sold for \$11,000 to support RSWR. Please bring your used stamps to the Spring Conference and learn more about this organization.

The symbol for RSWR is a hand with 3 seeds. This represents the seed money that can be used to sow gratitude and help others find a way.

PEACE AND CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

Let's concentrate on FEMAP (Friends Emergency Material Assistance Program) which is located across from Springfield Friends Meeting, High Point, North Carolina. This organization is an arm of our churches to bring peace to needy folk around us and in the larger world. Alicia Sharp, NCUSFW Treasurer, writes the following about FEMAP: "After more than 94 years of helping our fellow man, the American Friends Service Committee laid down its EMAP (Emergency Materials Assistance Program). Many of the volunteers who spent time and money on that program felt that humanitarian assistance was still needed in the state. In 2011, those and other volunteers came together and created FEMAP (Friends Emergency Materials Assistance Program). The doors of the historic Allen Jay House at 606 Springfield Road, High Point open every Wednesday from 10 am to 2 pm for volunteers to come in and put together hygiene, infant, school and farmer worker's kits. The financial support from many North Carolina Quaker Meetings and USFW circles make it possible to accomplish the goal. In the last five years, FEMAP has distributed over 300 handmade quilts and 5400 kits, especially the hygiene kits that are sent to homeless shelters monthly. FEMAP also receives used postage stamps which are sent to Jan McVay for Right Sharing of World Resources use. FEMAP welcomes knitted or crocheted items like toboggans, scarfs, gloves and children's blankets as well as all financial contributions." Be aware of the volunteers meet on Wednesdays at FEMAP from 10:00 am to 2:00 pm. There will be others at these meetings who will strengthen your faith and allow you to help in a tangible way to bring peace where it is needed. Judy Craven from Christian Service diligently reports different ways FEMAP is used to encourage us to work together as Friends and to look beyond our differences to meet common goals. Whenever you have a chance join this group on Wednesdays and enjoy their fellowship as you work.

Besides this information there is another bit that you should know. NCUSFW and Quaker Lake are sponsoring a Ladies Retreat and Weekend of Wellness on March 7th, 2020. You will find detailed information in this <u>Carolina Woman</u>. Join me in attending this event which will enrich your life.

We are thankful constantly for God's blessings on us but especially at this time of the year we are indeed grateful for the small acts of kindness of others toward us.

I want to share with my USFW sisters this devotional written by my dear friend Martha Eakes, a member of First Friends Meeting. It was given by her as part of the offertory on a Sunday morning during worship.

A truck driver waves to us to pass knowing the truck lumbers along and we can be on our way faster. We wave our thanks, and the driver nods in return. We say "Bless you" when someone sneezes, even to a stranger, then we both exchange smiles. Sometimes a conversation follows. The shopper who accidentally starts a fruit avalanche off the slanted counter display at the market and you and I stoop to retrieve apples and nectarines. That shopper is grateful and tells us and often a conversation follows. Don't these perhaps insignificant examples make us pretty sure that in life, we can acknowledge that we do need each other for both the small and the profound?

We have so little of each other now. We no longer live in multi-family tribes or communicate face to face. We work at home. It is almost as if these brief moments, such as the one with the sneezer, nudge us to query ourselves, "What if these moments are the true dwelling of the holy manifest when we say, "Here, take my seat" or "Go ahead. You first" or "I like your sweater. Bet it's warm, isn't it?" And sometimes a conversation follows. And we perhaps experience small talk that leads to big talk. It does, you know.

Our reaching out with small kindnesses and giving of our means with sincerity allow us to be defenders of all humans, to answer to each other for their needs, even tiny needs beyond their moments with cascading produce or the simple need to have a seat in an auditorium or bus.. None of these actions are heroic, just small kindnesses, but each can be witness to the compelling connections among us, and we need them, maybe even crave. In a quite similar way, it is our need that our offerings travel well beyond us for the simple or the profound.

STEWARDSHIP

Almost every Christian has heard the saying "you can't out-give God". There is a great deal of truth in that statement. The bible speaks loud and clear about giving, beginning in the Old Testament. "Every man shall give as he is able, according to the blessing of the LORD your God which He has given you." (Deuteronomy 16:17). This principle continues in the New Testament, (2 Corinthians 9:7) where we are told "So let each one give as he purposes in his heart, not grudgingly or of necessity; for God loves a cheerful giver."

There are countless online resources which talk about good stewardship of God's possessions. I have found the GAS principle at www.managinggodsmoney.com to be most interesting, and an excellent standard for how Christians should apply biblical stewardship of God's resources. This GAS principle contains three key biblical truths about money. These principles and their implications are outlined below:

God owns everything - (Psalm 24:1-2, Colossians 1:16)

Accept what you have - (Hebrews 13:5, 1 Timothy 6:7-8)

Seek first His Kingdom, and submit your requests to Him - (Matthew 6:33, Proverbs 19:21)

Biblical Truth #1: God Owns Everything

Since God owns 100%, we own nothing. Studies show that tithers have healthier finances than non-tithers. Grace giving is always the right thing to do.

Biblical Truth #2: Accept Who You Are

You are "fearfully and wonderfully made" in God's image. Accept who you are. Accept where you are. And be content with what you have. Don't follow others. Folks with "perfect bodies" aren't perfect. You are who you are. You are where you are. If you need to change your lifestyle, God can handle that. Ask Him to show you what to do with life, money, talents, and everything you have.

Accepting what you have means living in your circumstances but not allowing them to take your eyes off God. Recall the widow in 2 Kings 4:1-7; she had "a little oil" only, but Elisha helped her see she had plenty. And, so preoccupied was Elisha's servant with his circumstance, He could not see the victory God prepared until Elisha prayed to open his eyes.

Each believer in Jesus should understand that God is faithful, keeps His Word, and His divine power has granted everything the believer needs for life and godliness. A believer can do God's wishes because God's Spirit lives in him.

Biblical Truth #3: Seek First His Kingdom

Are you ready to seek first His kingdom and His righteousness? Are you prepared to do His plans; they will succeed. When you seek first His kingdom and His righteousness, you seek second, third, fourth, never, your plans. God has not promised to shower you with money. He will grant your needs. Have you seen a sparrow begging for food? His word says if you can't handle a little you can't handle much.

These three key biblical truths are not subjective, evolving principles, but eternal. When studied in context in the Bible, you will uncover lasting guidelines for daily living. God, the creator of the universe, owns everything. Living the GAS Principle will change your life, change your views, and change your role as His manager. Then you will:

- 1. Be more alert making lifestyle choice with money implications—with spending decisions.
- 2. Allow Jesus to lead you.
- 3. Accept you own nothing but are responsible to God as His manager or steward of everything He allows you to have while you are here on earth.
- 4. Realize accountability is a key part of stewardship. So, you will account to the Owner, Jesus, for money and everything you control.

FEMAP SERVICE PROJECT CONNECTIONS - Lindsay Shore-Wright

The children of Centre Friends Meeting make their way through each pew taking donated FEMAP items from our generous congregation on the last Sunday of each month. They load them into our little wagon, the FEMAP EXPRESS. John and Hazel Carroll deliver them to FEMAP. Over the last year and a half thousands of items have been collected. Our congregation has learned more about what FEMAP is and who it helps. I have found myself in need of support from Becke Jones and the volunteers who quickly meet my needs.

School kits for The Sidewalk School for Children Asylum Seekers—thousands of children are waiting with their families in Mexican towns along the U.S. border while they apply for asylum. These children are homeless. They can't return to their homes in Central America and Mexico because of the violence and poverty. They aren't allowed to wait in the safety of the USA while their cases are heard. Some families wait weeks, months and even years for the slow wheels of the process to turn and most will be denied asylum due to tighter restrictions. During this time, the children are missing lots of school, so non-profits and faith-based groups are trying to help. I heard about this group and was able to send 90 FEMAP school kits to help this school. It is entitled The Sidewalk School because it is literally school outside on the sidewalk for any child that wants to come. It was an honor to be *able to send love and support from NC Quakers to these refugee children in Matamoros, Mexico*.

Closer to home, I (Judy Craven) have needed FEMAP to help at my own school in Siler City, NC. They donated 100 stuffed bears to our 1st graders to be Reading Buddies. This class of students has an abnormally high number of little ones with trauma in their lives and I wanted some way to create a pleasant experience in the library. They each adopted a bear in December and the kids love them! Each child has a little bag for the bear and an adoption certificate. I hope the bears will provide comfort and encouragement while these students work on their reading skills.

I think God opens doors when we need them and least expect them. I am very thankful that the connection to FEMAP was made and they could extend help when I needed it.
